History of The Regional Planning Commission, Boards & Committees

The Northeast Missouri Regional Planning Commission (NEMO RPC) is one of nineteen regional planning commissions in the State of Missouri, which are authorized by the State of Missouri Regional Planning and Community Development Act of 1966, Revised Missouri Statutes Chapter 251. The Regional Planning and Community Development Act of 1966 permitted the establishment of regional planning commissions to formally organize and band together by counties to promote the spirit of cooperatively working together to solve problems and plan the future development of regions and the State of Missouri.

The Northeast Missouri Regional Planning Commission (NEMO RPC) was designated such by the State of Missouri by Governor Warren E. Hearnes on the 19th day of March in 1969. On this date, the Northeast Missouri Regional Planning Commission was created; with the boundaries of the commission's authority to coincide with the boundaries of the counties of Adair, Clark, Knox, Schuyler, and Scotland. The original region served the five counties and 27 incorporated cities for a total of 32 member governments in Northeast Missouri. During the year of 1992, Lewis County, Missouri petitioned the State of Missouri and the NEMO RPC membership to join the region. In late 1992, The State of Missouri assigned the County of Lewis to the boundaries of the Northeast Missouri Regional Planning Commission/ Rural Development Corporation and Economic Development District. We now serve Adair, Clark, Knox, Lewis, Schuyler, and Scotland counties and the 33 incorporated cities for a total of 39 member governments in Northeast Missouri.

On December 22, 1975, the Northeast Missouri RPC entered into a cooperative agreement with the Counties of Adair, Clark, Knox, Schuyler and Scotland to formulate the Public Housing Agency (PHA) for the member counties. The Northeast Missouri Regional Planning Commission was designated the administrative agency for the newly formed Public Housing Agency (PHA) and Scotland County was designated as the official signatory lead county to act on behalf of the member counties.

On August 16, 1978, the Northeast Missouri Regional Planning Commission incorporated the Northeast Rural Development Corporation (NEMO RDC) to expand the mission and objectives for the region in Northeast Missouri. The Corporation was established as a not-for-profit 501(c) 3 with the same by-laws as the Regional Planning Commission and the Commission and Corporation would be one and the same. On October 2, 1978, the region of Northeast Missouri was designated by the United States Department of Commerce, Economic Development Administration as the Northeast Missouri Economic Development District. This was authorized under Title V of the Public Works and Economic Development Act of 1985 to designate multi-county districts for the purpose of fostering and promoting their economic growth. In February 2013, we moved to our new location at 121 S. Cecil Street, Memphis, MO.



PURPOSE

The six counties of the Commission / Corporation are bound together by Executive Order as the Northeast Missouri Regional Planning Commission. The region shares as local units of government, not only a boundary line as such, but the active spirit of cooperatively working together to solve problems and plan the future development of Northeast Missouri. The region experiences the same human, natural, and economic development needs. The region as a unit promotes the public safety, general welfare, and the economic prosperity for our citizens.

The region is tied to and accounts for the relationship with our geographic and topography, the existence of our agricultural, rural and urban development. The region has uniform physical, social, and economical problems regional in nature.

STRUCTURE

An Executive Board of Directors that is appointed from the general membership governs the Commission/Corporation. The Executive Board is comprised of one county elected official or their designee and one city elected official or their designee from each of the six counties. The NEMO Executive Board comprises 13 total members.

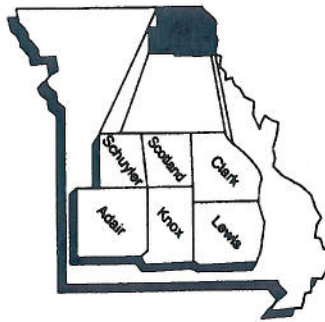
MEMBERSHIP

The membership of the Commission/ Corporation consists of local units of governments within the region boundaries. Membership is based on a voluntary basis. The members are assessed a membership assessment fee based on their population and are assessed on a calendar year. The operating budget is generated through income the commission can collect from program administration of State and

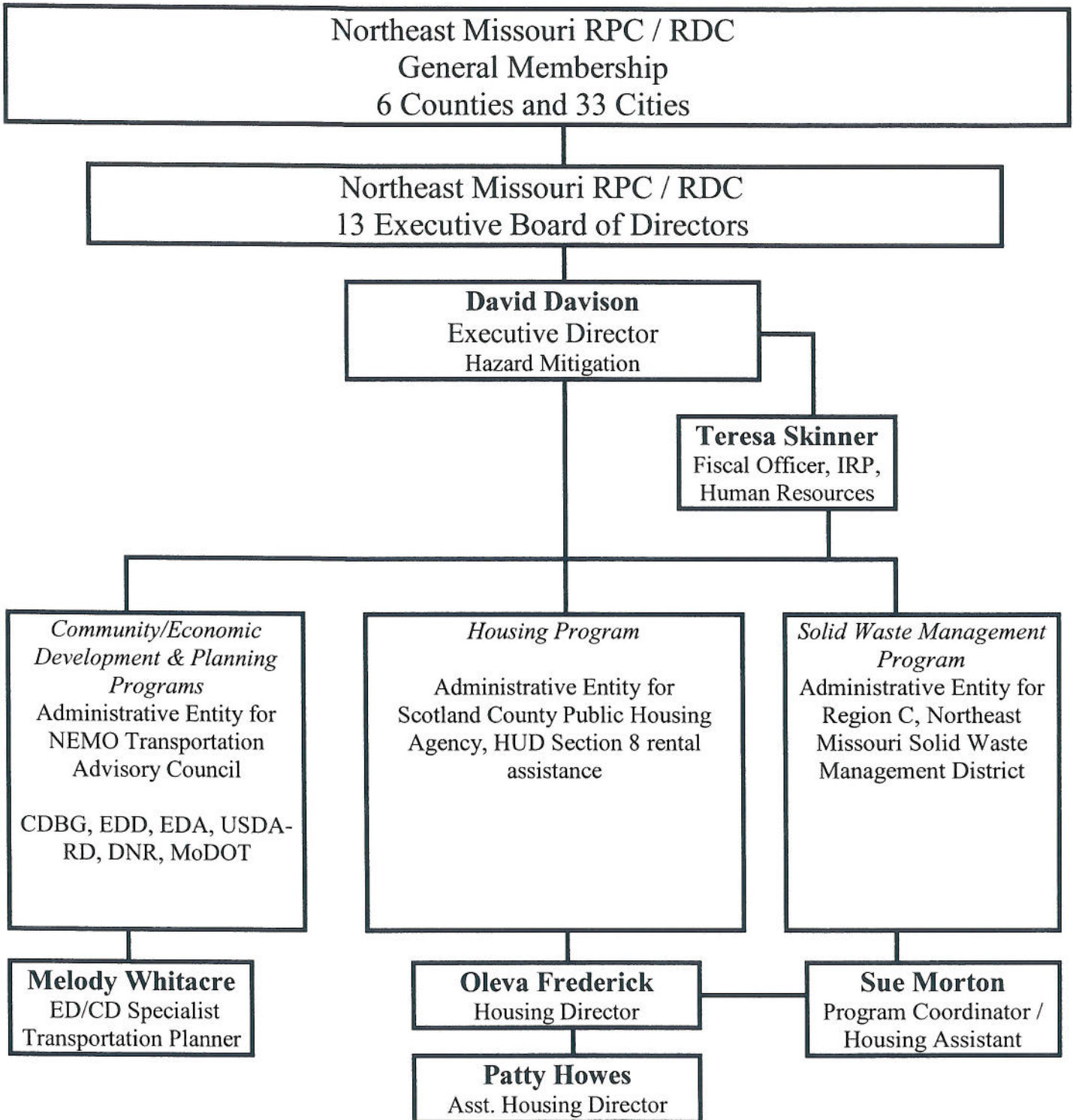
Federal programs and contract services. The funds generated from the assessments are used to match the various state and federal programs as well as the Office of Administration, State of Missouri's grant for the services performed for the region.

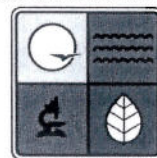
Solid Waste Management District

The State of Missouri Solid Waste Districts were created and authorized by the State of Missouri Solid Waste Act of 1992, Revised Missouri Statutes. Our Northeast Missouri District, Region C, was formed in 1993 under these statutes with an appointed Solid Waste Council from the County Commissions of Adair, Clark, Knox, Lewis, Schuyler, and Scotland Counties. The NEMO Solid Waste District Council membership is set up with two representatives from each county, and one representative from each incorporated community over the population of 500. From the Solid Waste Council an Executive Board of Directors is elected consisting of 12 members.

The NEMO Solid Waste Management District, Region C, has no employees and contracts with the NEMO Regional Planning Commission to perform administrative duties assigned by the MO Department of Natural Resources. NEMO RPC staff devotes time toward the development and implementation of a solid waste management plan for the six county area and oversees the regulatory and administrative documentation necessary to stay in compliance with state statutes.

Region C provides a District Grant Program to provide financial assistance to cities, counties, non-profits and other organizations for the purposes of

1). Developing new or improved programs that will reduce the generation of solid waste; 2). Creating new or improving existing markets for recovered materials, and 3). Improving the handling of items banned from landfills by Missouri law. Funds are awarded to sub-grantees for projects that are sustainable, lead to long term diversion, and have maximum impact on waste minimization while creating or sustaining jobs.

NEMO Recycling Opportunities

The City of Canton operates a collection facility for most recyclables in their area. Community Opportunities in Kirksville and Industrial Opportunities in Kahoka offer drop-off locations in several communities. The City of Memphis offers cardboard collection, both as drop-off and commercial pick-up services. Two communities have curbside recycling pick-up programs. A glass collection facility is currently under development in Kirksville. The City of Kirksville offers a Household Hazardous Waste Collection program for residents. Larger grocery and department stores have containers available for drop-off of plastic shopping bags and plastic film. Auto parts stores such as O'Reilly's and AutoZone collect and recycle used motor oil and lead acid batteries. Some stores also collect used oil filters, brake pads, rotors, radiators, etc. Walmart collects used small printer ink cartridges for recycling.

Scotland County Public Housing Agency (SCPHA)

The Scotland County Public Housing Agency (SCPHA) administers Housing Choice Vouchers for the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development in Adair (excluding the City of Kirksville), Clark, Knox, Schuyler and Scotland Counties. SCPHA has 329 vouchers available monthly for assistance.

The Section 8 Housing Choice Voucher Program is designed for low-income families who wish to live in homes, apartments or mobile homes in the private rental market, but who cannot afford market rental rates. SCPHA is always looking for new rentals. The mission of the Scotland County Public Housing Agency is to meet the emerging, affordable housing needs of low to moderate income individuals and families while promoting self-reliance and improving their quality of life. The primary objectives of the Section 8 Housing Choice Voucher Program are:

- To assist families in finding affordable housing.
- To ensure that the unit meets Housing Quality Standards
- To assist families with rental payments

The family's rent is based on total family income. A family with a voucher usually contributes 30% of their monthly-adjusted income for rent and utilities. Housing subsidy is paid to the landlord directly by the PHA on behalf of the participating family. The family then pays the difference between the actual rent charged by the landlord and the amount subsidized by the program.

Scotland County Public Housing Agency Complex Management

SCPHA took over full management of the 16 unit housing complex for Novinger Housing Association in April of 2015. They also help with the Conkle Street Apartments in Brashear, MO by completing all qualifying and/or other paperwork for NEMO RDC.



Economic Development Administration (EDA)

The Northeast Missouri Regional Planning Commission and Economic Development District works closely with its member governments to improve the economy and living environment of the District. Our Region actively updates the Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (CEDS) for continuation of the Northeast Missouri Administrative Planning Grant provided by the U.S. Department of Commerce, Economic Development Administration (EDA). To aid in formulating a work program to achieve its goals, the Commission has adopted the following specific regional objectives:



1. Employment Development:

Work with local governments, local economic development organizations and other agencies/interest groups to promote job creation, economic growth and expansion; Enhance the economic vitality and quality of life of our communities; Research and identify job development needs suitable for review and consideration as projects; Promote and manage the NEMO Revolving Loan Fund (RLF) which consists of the Intermediary Relending Program.

2. Standard Work Program Elements:

Work as a member of the Missouri Association of Council of Governments (MACOG) to support all economic development efforts and legislation that will enhance the business community and employment base of the State of Missouri; Attend national, statewide, regional and local meetings to assist communities and organizations and develop professional capacity of the organization; Distribute information to the region announcing funding and training opportunities and policy changes and development; Provide for the updating of the District's Website which is live and accessible at www.nemorpc.org.

3. Community Development/Transportation:

Reassess the adequacy of community utilities/services and transportation facilities throughout the Region; Determine possible Small Bridge Replacement Projects in the Northeast Counties.

4. Natural Resources and Energy:

Assess alternative sources of energy in the Region for use in electrical generation, industrial production, agricultural production, home heating and transportation; Establish, in cooperation with private firms and public agencies, significant demonstration projects of alternative sources of energy at widespread locations throughout the Region.

5. Environment:

Update and implement a Solid Waste Management Plan thru the NEMO Region C Solid Waste Management District; Complete necessary revisions to environmental reviews for the Community Development Block Grant applications; Complete the new multi-hazard mitigation plan updates for each County; Distribute the land utilization planning assignment for land use in areas located within flood zones or other high hazard geographic areas.

Northeast Missouri Transportation Advisory Council (TAC)

The Northeast Missouri Transportation Advisory Council (TAC) is comprised of eighteen (18) members representing county government, city government, transportation corridor groups, other transportation partners and the Missouri Department of Transportation. There are three (3) members in each county and are appointed by the County Commissioners from that County.

The TAC integrates local communities into the statewide transportation planning process by accepting responsibilities such as attending and participating in quarterly regional meetings; recognizing the scope of work to be accomplished by the TAC and the Northeast Missouri Regional Planning Commission/Rural Development Corporation; acknowledging the planning framework process and how the TAC's involvement is incorporated into the process; providing input and prioritizing transportation needs and projects within our Region and its communities; and distributing information to communities and residents.



Hazard Mitigation

Hazard mitigation is any sustained action taken to reduce or eliminate the long-term risk to human life and property from hazards. Mitigation activities may be implemented prior to, during or after an incident. It has been demonstrated that hazard mitigation is most effective when based on an inclusive, comprehensive, long-term plan that is locally developed before a disaster occurs. The Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act provides that local governments undertake a risk based approach to reducing risks to natural hazards through mitigation planning. The completion of these updated plans every 5 years, allows for jurisdictions to apply for Hazard Mitigation Grant Program, which provides funds following a Presidential disaster declaration, for eligible mitigation activities that reduce losses, protect life and property from future disaster damages. Grant applications must be submitted to the state and then the applications are sent to the federal level for the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) approval.

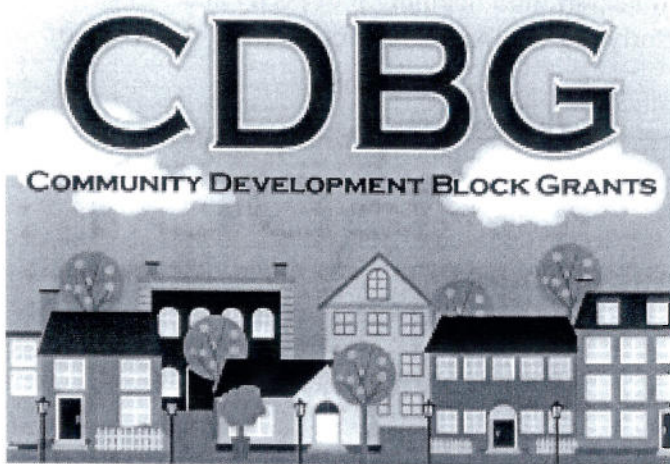

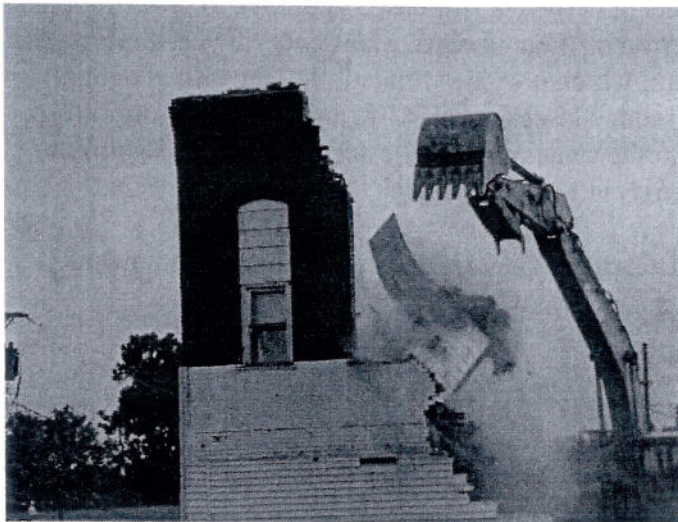
Community Development Block Grants

The Missouri Department of Economic Development administers a wide array of services and programs designed to enhance Missouri's economic growth and to create solid, high-paying jobs. These essential services focus on workers, businesses and communities. The department is composed of agencies that administer statutory requirements and department policy in the areas of community, economic and workforce development.



The Community Development Block Grant Program (CDBG) offers grants to small Missouri communities to improve local facilities, address critical health and safety concerns, and develop a greater capacity for growth. We offer funds for projects that can range from housing and street repairs to industrial loans and job training. This program is authorized through the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974 (Public Law 93-383), as amended. CDBG is a "pass through" funding program from the US Department of Housing and Urban Development. State CDBG funds are only available to non-entitlement areas (incorporated municipalities under 50,000 and counties under 200,000 in population). The

maximum amount available varies, depending on the type of project. Please refer to the individual categories for more information. Depending on the funding category, applications are either accepted on a continuous cycle throughout the year or have a specific deadline.



Grants currently open in our district are: Scotland County bridge



replacement, City of Lewistown Wastewater Treatment Facility Improvements, Knox City Wastewater Treatment Facility Improvements, City of Wayland Potable Water Project, City of Downing Demolition, City of Novinger Demolition, and the City of Brashear Wastewater Treatment Facility Improvements Project.

Northeast Missouri Revolving Loan Fund Program

Northeast Missouri Regional Planning Commission (NEMO RPC) continues to assist businesses and industries in the creation of new jobs and the retention of existing jobs for Northeast Missouri.

In 2004 the NEMO RPC created the Northeast Missouri Revolving Loan Fund (RLF), which consists of the Intermediary Relending Program (IRP). NEMO RPC, in partnership with USDA-Rural Development established the program to fill financing gaps not covered by conventional lenders.

Small businesses and start-up enterprises often have difficulty borrowing all the money necessary to finance fixed assets, inventory, working capital, etc. from traditional financial institutions.

Since 2004 the funds have been used for: Business acquisitions, construction and enlargement; repair, modernization and development costs; developing land, building facilities or materials; machinery, equipment and inventory.

While certain restrictions exist, the NEMO RLF is designed to provide financing for businesses which cannot obtain adequate funds from conventional sources.

Conkle Street

Apartments

(Brashear Rentals)

Conkle Street Apartments (Brashear Rentals), Brashear MO, are owned and managed by Northeast Missouri Rural Development Corporation/Regional Planning Commission. The rentals are totally electric. The HVAC system includes central air and heat pump. Seven (7) units are two (2) story duplexes with three (3) bedrooms and full bath upstairs and kitchen, dining area, full bath, laundry and living room downstairs. One (1) unit is a one (1) story ADA compliant three (3) bedroom unit.



Electric range, electric dryer, washer and refrigerator appliances will be provided. Rent is currently \$ 475 per month. All utilities, except trash pickup, are the responsibility of the tenant. All tenants must meet eligibility requirements and comply with all obligations/regulations. It is our policy that tenants be at least 18 years of age and able to enter into a lease.

Section 8 vouchers may be available if needed. The target population for this project are families in need of safe and affordable three-bedroom homes (single or two-parent households). The site is easily accessible by either walking or personal vehicle. The local Adair R-II, K-12 public school system is located in the Northwest corner of the City limits.

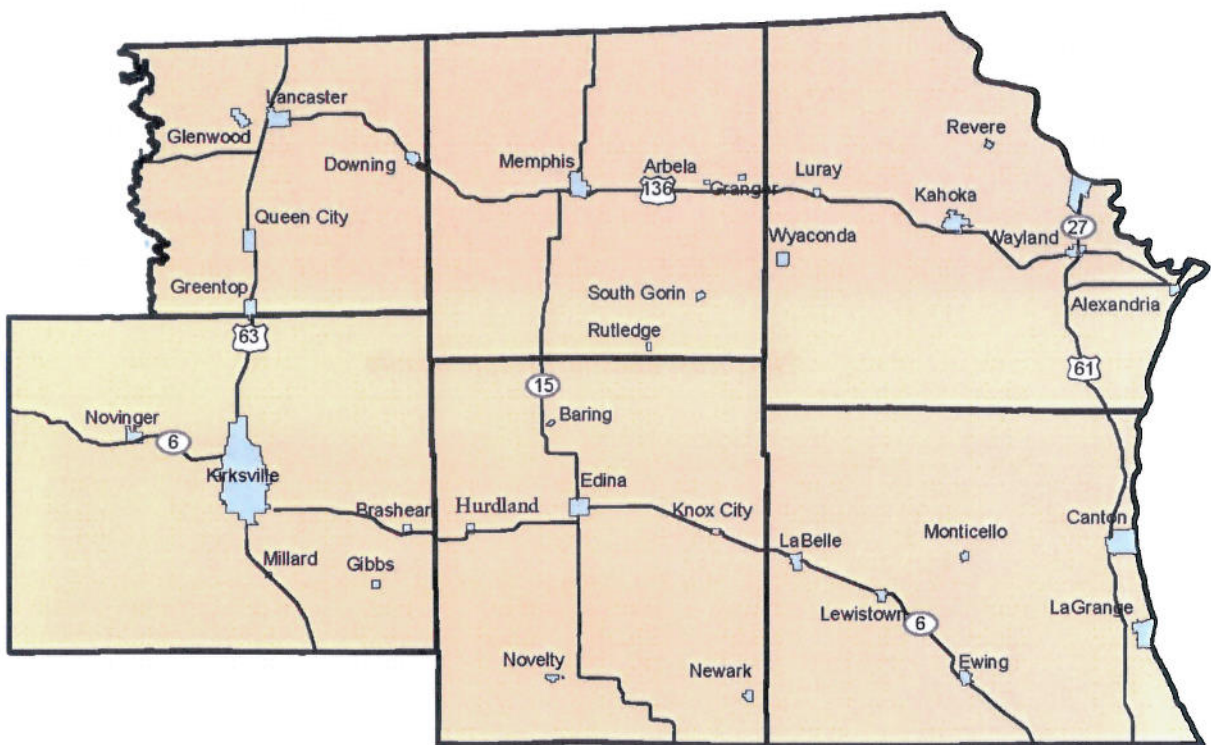
